


Over the past several years, we have been working with the Town to make sure grant monies the Friends secured will be put to good use in our Children's area. The process, which began Continued on page 3

Thanks to the continued support from our community and donations received, we were able to replace and upgrade the shelving in a portion of our library. With the help of the HFL Robotics Team, we were able to swap out the older units (recycling all the steel), to make way for the lovely, rightsized shelving.

By late October, everything was looking great when we welcomed nationally-known author Peter Lovenheim back to the Mendon Public Library for a book talk on his latest publication, The Attachment Effect. The reading room was packed with community members sharing in great conversation and enjoying refreshments offered by the Friends.

Dedicated:


Advocacy for Our Community & Services

Highlights of 2018

The Friends of the Mendon Public Library Continues to Improve the Library

The Friends of the Mendon Public Library continues to support the Mendon Public Library with funding efforts and guidance on library improvements. The Friends reached out to the community in the spring of 2018 with the "Sweet as Pie" funding ask, and, thankfully, the community responded generously. With donations from that ask and ongoing in-library book and bag sales, the Friends were able to assist with upgrades to outdated shelving. In addition, the Friends supported library programming.

Looking ahead, the Friends continue to work with the Library Board of Trustees and Town of Mendon officials to see the successful completion of two grant projects. These projects will hopefully be completed in the first quarter of 2019. One will upgrade the children's area of the library by opening an existing wall to create a more accessible, brighter, and safer place for our young patrons to explore and learn. The second project includes a storage closet near the circulation desk. Funding for both of these projects was secured through two state programs, the NYS SAMS Grant and the NYS Public Library Construction Grant.







Value of Services

Thanks to our community and the Friends of the Mendon Public Library, MPL consistently offers various services free of charge to the general public that would normally cost extra. We have calculated the cost of equivalent services based on national averages collected and calculated by the American Library Association. This year alone, our library has provided the equivalent of \$1,342,196 in services to the public.
