Programming Highlights for March 2023 (K. Paganelli Reporting)

Kids: February was a busy month for kids at the library. We had events that drew in some of our regulars and some visitors from other libraries. Firefly Friends was at full capacity in February. World Read Aloud Day did not garner a huge audience, but we did have several volunteers offer to read during the day. Our artists-in-residence, Rachel DeVona, has been attracting both young and adult participants. It's awesome to have her working away in the library on our new "stained glass" windows. The Black Storytelling event drew in a large crowd of local adults and a full contingent of young people from East Rochester. The storytellers were terrific and held everyone's attention for the full hour, even inspiring some singing. Winter break programs, including Rainbow Fish Performance and Imagine Day: Rube Goldberg Creations, had decent audiences. The Giant Jenga on loan from Central also added to a fun month of activities for our young patrons.

We're pleased to report that a local 2nd grader was the winner of the system wide Amerks Reading Program Grand Prize. Word from the community said this little guy had a fantastic time at an Amerks Game, got to drop the puck, and was treated very well by all the players. Our school librarians really push this at their libraries, and it appears our library submits a larger percentage of the "hat trick" reading entries.

In March, we'll continue with Story Time, Firefly Friends, Paws to Relax, There's More to the Story "Stained Glass," and offer a special Saturday event - Grupo Cultural Latinos Carnival Show.

Teen Involvement: Our Teen Trashion Show, which Nipa and her daughter assisted with, was set to run, but will be reworked and possibly offered again in the summer or fall. We'll continue to encourage teens to join us at the artist-in-residence program, Saturday Carnival event, and Meditation Mondays.

Adults: February attendance for adult programs was robust. We had 12 adults at the Overdose Prevention Program, a few logons for the "In This Moment" event, a few at each of our artist-in-residence events, and full contingents for the Meditation Monday event, Houseplant Care Talk, and Women in Engineering Local Author event, with a few at an especially stormy evening Travel Talk.
