

If You're So Smart, How The Adventures of Everyday Come You Can't Spell Mississippi? Barbara Esham (picture book)



The real-life, classic story of a dyslexic girl and the teacher who would not let her fail. A perfect gift for teachers and for reading students of any age.






A Walk in the Woods **Hudson Talbott** (picture book)
