Programming Highlights for January 2026 (Kelly P reporting)

Kids: December found us enjoying all kinds of special events at the library. Wonderful story times, special break week events, and even special guest visits and parading with everyone's

favorite character, Pete the Cat. We were also pleased to offer a special event at Pinehurst – Holiday Story Time for Young Children and Seniors. Everyone in attendance enjoyed singing, reading, and decorating delicious holiday cookies.

Our community seems to be fully engaged in our programming and appreciates the opportunities for gathering and learning that the library provides. That's a great gift to all of us who work hard to put on these events. We're also very thankful to our wonderful volunteers who help create crafts, decorate the library, keep things tidy and organized, and even step into character roles to help us out.

So far, we have fifty-two entries for the Amerks Reading Power Play Program. That's 156 books read! This program runs through the end of January, so hopefully, we will have even more books read to report then.

Book (BOT) and Program (Friends) Budgets for 2026 should allow us to build our collections, including the ever-popular Tonies (\$1,000 from Friends for Tonies) and events, as our community has grown accustomed to.

Planning for the 2026 Summer Reading Program, "Unearth a Story" is already in progress. We typically try to have everything set by March. This year, the Kickoff for Summer Reading might be even more eventful as we celebrate the 15th Anniversary of our beautiful building.

Teen Involvement: The VolunTeens group has been meeting each week with camaraderie and fun building with each session. Miss Emily has led them in some tasks that just had not worked their way to the top of the "to-do list." Our thanks to our teens for getting things done!

We cannot wait to hold our first-ever Super Smash Brothers Video Game event in early January. New video games purchased with Teen Grant monies will also be on the shelves in the new year.

Adults: Our grant application to RRLC to get funding for a Marketing/Capacity Building Program with Causewave was submitted by the December 17th deadline. We're hoping to find out if we have received this grant by January 19th.

Adult programs continue to attract varied groups of community members. Knitters, poets, gardeners, readers, and movie fans can all find something to enjoy at the MPL.

Finally, staff have been working through several of the Sustainable Library initiatives. We've checked off several boxes and are seeking new partnerships and programming opportunities with environmental groups as we try to complete all of Section A. Look for new alliances and more environmental programs in 2026.
